A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PRESIDENT:

David and I have just passed our 6th anniversary living in Savannah. I am still trying to get the hang of gardening in the South! Most of the rules I knew in Wisconsin are out the window, here in zone 9. I do have several books that have helped me make the transition. One of my favorites is called GARDENING IN THE COASTAL SOUTH, written by Marie Harrison. She tells me that now is the time to divide and replant crowded perennials such as Easter lilies, tiger lilies, daylilies, African iris, crinum lilies, phlox, and other summer bloomers. The general rule of thumb is to divide spring bloomers in the fall and the fall bloomers in the spring. That gives time for the plants to reestablish before bloom time. She also tells me to plant vegetables such as spinach, kale, turnips, mustard, and cabbage plants. Arugula, loose leaf and bibb lettuces can be joined by onions, radishes, carrots, and herbs. I have been growing herbs up on my deck over the last few years, but think I'll try a few of the lettuces and cabbage this fall. The deer keep me from planting veggies in the yard, but I'm sure some of you can give it a try.

NATIONAL GARDEN CLUBS, INC. PROJECTS

National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC) is recognized as the largest volunteer gardening organization in the world with nearly 200,000 members. Since 1929, it has provided garden club members with educational opportunities in all aspects of gardening and floral design.

NGC aids in the protection and conservation of natural resources, promotes civic beautification and encourages the improvement of roadsides and parks.

The Landings Garden Club is part of this organization. Every two years, with the change in administration, the new president of NGC develops a theme with projects recommended for participation in by individual clubs and councils. The new president, Shirley Nicolai's theme is "Proudly Serving our Members and Communities." Her projects are community and club oriented. She emphasizes three projects.

First is Planting for Public and Special Places. This project recognizes all garden club service to communities when members provide plantings for public and special places. These plantings can beautify, have environmental value or provide sustenance. The Landings Garden Club continues to work on or support projects in this area including the Village Library plantings, The Sparrow Field plantings, the butterfly garden at the state park, the botanical garden center on Eisenhower Dr. and Arbor Day activities.

The second project is Protecting Aquatic Ecosystems. Aquatic ecosystems include rivers, lakes, ponds, streams, creeks, springs, marshes, bogs, wetlands, coastal estuaries, floodplains and aquifers. Our monthly causeway cleanup certainly qualifies as protecting our aquatic ecosystem. A few suggested strategies for garden clubs is educating the public, working with other organizations sharing like concerns and becoming legislatively informed and involved.

The last project is Photo Archiving of Accomplishments. The Landings Garden Club is already doing this locally through our website! The NGC would like all clubs to share information on a FLICKR site. SEPTEMBER MEETING MINUTES OF THE LANDINGS GARDEN CLUB – SEPTEMBER. 26, 2011

The Business Meeting of the Landings Garden Club was called to order by President Judy Sweeterman at 10:00 AM. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. The Collect was read by Leslie Bowler.

Ways and Means: Pat Sunshine and Sandy Randolph reported on the Holliday Bow and Bulb sale as follows:

- (1) Linda Tompkins is in charge of flyer distribution. She asked for sign-ups today.
Flyer distribution will be the week of Oct. 23rd.
- (2) Kathy Zmijewski is in charge of bow and bulb sale orders. She identified 3 venues where we will be taking orders. She asked for sign-ups. We will need 2 people each for 2 shifts at each at the following venues:
 - (a) The Landings Art Show, Oct. 29 at the Village.
 - (b) The Artisan Market, Nov. 12 at the Plantation Club.
 - (c) The Village Pharmacy on Mondays from mid-November to mid-December.

(3) Jeannie Ahrens is in charge of distributing the bows and bulbs once they have been ordered. Distribution will occur around the last week of November or the first week of December. She asked for sign-ups today.

(4) Lisa Hall reported on the Amaryllis bulbs that we will be selling this year. They are the pink and white Aphrodite and the red and white Pasadena. They will be \$20 each and the form for placing orders can be printed from our website.

A question was asked regarding why we are no longer selling our bows and bulbs at Smith's IGA in the Village. Judy Sweeterman explained that Smith's has stopped the sale of everything in front of their store, with one or two exceptions, due to customer complaints.

Minutes from the April meeting were accepted as printed in the Sept. Petal Pusher.

The Sept. Petal Pusher has been distributed and is available on the website.

There were 44 members and 7 guests present. The guests were Nancy Thompson, Val Stocklin, Virginia Marcotullio, Connie O'Donnell, Karen Lindholm, Vicky Kramer and Judy Woodard.

The Treasurer's Report was read and accepted. Balance on hand is \$7175.08 in the checking account and \$3963.68 in the CD's.

Nancy Rosenthal announced a plant sale to be held at the Botanical Gardens on Oct.1 from 8:00 – 2:00. They are asking for volunteers to work at the sale as well as for plants to be donated for sale. Contact Nancy if you are interested.

Judy Sweeterman read an invitation from the Cassena Garden Club on St. Simon's Island for their 27th Annual Tour of Homes and Bake Sale to be held Dec. 10th from 10-4. Cost is \$25.

Judy Sweeterman showed a poster of a print of the Landings which had been dry-mounted by her son, John, for use with our Holiday Bow and Bulb sales. It was suggested that we send John an amaryllis bulb for his contribution.

Judy thanked Lisa Hall and Ann Guira for their job on the yearbook, Lynn Barnard for her work on updating the Petal Pusher, and Meg Bremer for her flower arrangement to be raffled off today.

Jean Wrenn thanked Cynthia Calder, Margie Hardesty, Meg Bremer, Anne Guira and Mary Stuart for their contributions as hostesses today.

Anne Dauray announced that next month's meeting will celebrate the 25th anniversary of our club and we will celebrate with a tea. Invitations will be sent out by email. Ann asked that we respond by Oct 8th. She also asked for any member who may have colorful luncheon plates that could be used for the tea to contact her.

Committee Reports

Awards - Lisa Hall announced that our club had received an Honorable Mention for our newsletter and our membership brochure, second place award for our yearbook and first place award for our website from the

Garden Club of Georgia. She also announced that the National Garden Club has changed its theme this year to “Proudly serving our members and communities.” The NGC has taken on photo archiving as its third project.

Birds – Linda Sue Babcock reported on the recent snake alert in the Landings, Orphaned Bird Care and on an Eastern Kingbird which has shown up in her yard. She showed charts which showed that Savannah is on the migration path for several species of birds.

Causeway Clean-up – Sandy Humphrey reminded us that Causeway Clean-up is every first Monday of the month from September through May. Those interested in participating should gather at Smith’s at 8 am to receive their assignment. Next clean-up will be Oct. 3rd.

Gate Decorations – Libby Cluett will have sign-ups sheets for this project at next month’s meeting.

Library - Cynthia Calder reported that new installations of native plants had been completed this past Friday and included 6 dwarf bottlebrush and 6 Goodwin Gray lavenders. Other plants were moved. The category of plants for this project has been expanded to butterfly-attracting plants as well as native plants.

Community Service – Priss Wentworth announced that we will continue to collect toiletries etc. for Georgia Regional Hospital. They have added independent living apartments and need things like bed linens. She will prepare an itemized list for us before next month’s meeting. Meg Bremer reminded us to continue to bring in pull tabs from cans for Ronald McDonald House. She has 2 purse-size calendars left for sale.

SACGC – Dixie Diffenderfer asked for submissions for designs for next year’s calendar. They must be in by Jan.1, 2012. Oleander District Meeting is Oct. 11th. Anyone wishing to go should contact Dixie. Cost is \$25 and it will be at Epworth by the Sea on St. Simon’s Island.

Horticulture – Sandra Wolfe presented for Karen Gross this month and brought in two fall bloomers in her yard, Odontonema or “Firespike” and Red Salvia. Both produce red spikey blooms and are attractive to butterflies.

The Meeting was adjourned at 11:00 and Edith Teifeld introduced our speaker, Annie Quinting who is with Oatland Island and brought us a program on “Understanding the Misunderstood.” She brought in a corn snake, also known as a red rat snake, an opossum and an armadillo.
