Come join us on Tuesday, May 2nd to visit the COR compost facility. This will be an interesting trip and is sure to inspire you to get composting.

IT'S ALL ABOUT THE DIRT...FEED YOUR SOIL!



Did you know...COR has a pick-up and delivery service? They provide a bucket and liner for you to save your kitchen scraps, etc., and pick these up on a weekly or bi-weekly basis (\$20 per month for weekly service / \$15 per month bi-weekly).

Besides the great feeling of giving back to the earth, COR has a rewards program. The rewards program is based on the weight of the food scraps you submit and in return they give you half of the weight in compost. For example, if you turn in 100 lbs of food scraps you will receive 50 lbs of compost. They also provide a great delivery service if you prefer to only purchase compost. Great for your gardening needs!

Inspired by pink lanterns, blue café settings and colorful borders of roses and carnations, Nancy and Anne have created a delightful arrangement that includes hydrangeas, delphinium, chrysanthemum and more. Gentle hues of blue, pink and yellow are accented with purple and green to provide a virtual map of Mimi Diamond's festive café setting.

The flowers selected here represent more than the painting itself. And every flower has its own story and meaning. The Hydrangea's beautiful, billowing blooms symbolize hope and love to those who offer forgiveness. Japanese legend has it that a ruling emperor was



so preoccupied with his government and business affairs that he neglected a beautiful maiden that he loved dearly. As a gesture of his remorse, he gave her blue Hydrangeas as a symbol of his sincere apology and gratitude for her affection.

Delphinium are associated with romance, due to their dreamy, gentle hues. In the Victorian language of flowers, the Delphinium is associated with transcending the bounds of space and time. Deeper blues represent dignity and grace while the lighter shades symbolize youth and success.

First cultivated centuries ago in China, the Chrysanthemum was used primarily as a culinary herb. Its petals and young shoots were used in salads while its flowers and leaves were brewed into teas. It was believed to have the power of life and adopted as the official seal of the Japanese emperor.

With their fuzzy, ball-shaped blooms, Dianthus Green Trim flowers were used here for a touch of whimsy. These belong to the Carnation family. Often used as the flower of love, the Carnation has been used for the past 100 years as the official Mother's Day flower. Put together, these varied stories of flowers and parties, passions and loves enrich the gardening experience for all of us. Enjoy!

#### Skidaway Farm Project - Volunteer Sign Up and Information

Thanks to all who came out to Skidaway Farms and volunteered to help with feeding the hungry with LGC veggies. The Social Apostolate of Savannah is an organization that does so much good and they have been the recipient of our vegetables for the past 2 years. Below is a checklist of what needs to be done to maintain our plot - the plot with the Rooster:

**Water** - water the soil / ground not the plants. During hot spells Tomatoes may need more water than irrigation provides. Remember the water at the farm is not potable, so bring your own water source for personal thirst. The Farm water is good for the plants but not drinking.

**Pests** - check leaves for yellowing, browning or holes. Look for pests both above and under the leaves. Watch out for fire ants and observe if they are building a mound. Also watch out for wasps around the hose - they tried to nest there last year. If you find an issue that should be dealt with, please let Jayne Rogers know asap: <u>JMRogers341@gmail.com</u>.

**Weed** - a hoe works well but hand weed if you prefer. Clean hands, clean gloves, and clean tools are important to keep from passing pathogens from one place to the next. Bring a bag or bucket for weeds, and empty weeds into the dumpster which is always at the far end of the parking lot near the port o potty.

**Comfort** - plan to go early in they day, before 10 am for most pleasant, cool conditions before the sun rises over the trees. Bring bug spray and wear closed-toe shoes if possible (Flip Flops are inadvisable, especially with potential fire ants in the area).

Photos - please take pictures on your phone for weekly progress reacaps.

**Harvest** - when a vegetable needs to be harvested, we will let you know and it will be great if you can help. If not, it is understandable as the harvest is not always predictable.

Volunteers are needed to assist with attending the garden. Any day, and anytime in daylight - remember the electric fence is on from dusk to dawn.

Skidaway Farms is a great project to help with hunger in our community. It is a small thing but fresh, organic vegetables are so special and sharing them with the less fortunate is a mighty effort.
