### Horticulture Submitted by Meg Kettlitz

We all have a favorite food/foods from our childhood or maybe from a favorite restaurant or even ones that you prepare at home. My favorite foods remind me of my years spent in Italy. The aromas, flavors and freshness are out of this world.

Monarch butterflies also have a favorite food, in fact they only eat one species of plant and this is milkweed (Asclepias). But, not all milkweed are equal. In Georiga we have 20 types of native milkweed. We live in the Coastal Plain with a cold hardiness of 8b. Some of the milkweed native to the Coastal Plain are Asclepias incarnate (swamp), Asclepias perennial (aquatic) and Asclepias tuberose (butterfly). These plants are found at native plant sales and nurseries.

Unfortunately, many of the big box nurseries sell only Asclepias curassavica (tropical milkweed). The common name should tell you immediately that is is not from Georgia. In fact, it is not native anywhere in the continental US. If you have tropical milkweed, the best solution is to remove it including its roots. If you really want to keep it, it is important to remove the seed pods before they open & dispose them in the garbage. The seed pods should not be added to a compost pile. By removing the seed pods you prevent the plant from spreading. You should also make sure to prune the tropical milkweed down to the ground in September. This may be heartbreaking for you as the plant may have eggs as well as caterpillars on it. If you choose not to prune the tropical milkweed, you trick the monarch butterfly into laying more eggs and continuing its' southern migration. Tropical milkweed in our cold-hardiness zone will continue to bloom until a freeze. In late December 2022 and mid-January 2023, there were still tropical milkweeds that were blooming that had caterpillars on them. Sadly, the butterflies and caterpillars are not able to survive such cold temperatures. Your attempt to help the monarch is thus defeated.

However, if you plant one or more types of the native GA milkweed, the monarchs will find the blossoms at precisly the correct time on their northern migration as well as their return south. Since these are native GA milkweeds, they also provide a more nutritious meal. Think of them as a healthy choice vs a fast food one.

## Horticulture continued...

The native GA milkweeds tend to be less invasive than the tropical one. The aquatic seeds will only spread via water flow, so if you plant in a moist sunny location in your yard it should stay there. Butterfly and swamp do spread with wind but are more picky about where they will grow than the tropical. Butterfly milkweed likes dry soil that tends to be sandy. All three of these milkweeds like sun. There is also a shade tolerant one called whorled, but this variety is difficult to find.

# SAVE A TREE... YOUR HELP IS NEEDED!

A Historic Live Oak Tree, close to 200 years old, is slated for removal this fall as part of the Pametto Course renovation. A group of Landings residents are requesting a hearing for reconsideration of this decision by The Landings Club Board.

A hired course architect has recommended the removal of a number of trees on the entire course. On hole #17, closest to the 100 yard marker, sits the tree in jeopardy. Course agronomists and course superintendents maintain that the turf grass fails to grow under the shaded canopy of the tree. Several golfers have complained their shot is compromised or encounters tree limbs.

#### What do we know about this tree:

- Southern Live Oak, Quercus Virginiana
- State Tree of Georgia
- After recognized measurement protocol, we estimate the tree to be 194 years old / Circumference x 3.14 = approximate age
- Recognition factors: "Nobel Oak" 150-200 years of age / "Veteran Oak" 150 - 300 years

#### A "VETERAN OAK" IS A TREE WORTHY OF SAVING!

With the help of friends spreading the word, we currently have over 150 electronically signed supporters opposed to the removal of this exceptional Live Oak. Obtaining names is part of a crucial component in our strategy to encourage the Landings Club Board to reconsider its judgment. In today's world, protecting and preserving our environmental ecosystems remains a high priority.
