Happy Fall!

Here in the "Deep South," the arrival of fall doesn't quite bring the traditional sweater weather or the satisfying crunch of leaves underfoot. But fear not, for Savannah offers us the delightful experience of a "Second Spring." While many gardeners are tucking their plots in for winter, we have the unique opportunity to embrace this season by planning and planting a vibrant array of new greenery.

This time of year is ideal for gardening, with reduced humidity, cooler soil temperatures, and fewer pesky insects. If you have space, consider planting cool-weather vegetables. For those with limited room, container gardening presents a perfect solution—just remember to keep your pots out of reach from the deer!

Some of my favorite spring flowers, like Larkspur, Chinese foxgloves, Bachelor Buttons, Bells of Ireland, and Hollyhocks, are best planted now. Don't forget to order seeds for spring-blooming Poppies and Sweet Peas, which will add vibrant colors and delightful fragrances to your garden.

By now I hope everyone has recovered from our third tropical storm of the season. Though power outages were inconvenient, we are grateful that none of the storms made direct landfall. Our thoughts are with those who experienced more significant losses.

On a more somber note, I regret to inform you that starting in November, we will no longer have coffee and morning refreshments. With 109 members, it's disheartening that no one has volunteered to Chair or Co-Chair this position. Without a volunteer, I have no choice but to discontinue our morning coffee break. However, there's still time for someone to step forward and take on the role of Hospitality Chair and Co-Chair. I remain hopeful that one of you will reach out soon!

Imagine the beauty of yellow rivers of daffodils gracing The Landings! It's comforting to know that once they sprout and bloom, deer won't munch on them. Unfortunately, most daffodil bulbs struggle in the "Deep South" due to the lack of chill hours needed for their growth and blooming each year. However, a few varieties thrive in our coastal climate, including the Narcissus 'Carlton' Bulb.

As a fundraiser for our club, we have ordered and received 1,000 bulbs that will be sold in bags of 10 for \$10.00. These bulbs yield stunning two-toned yellow daffodils that grow 18-20 inches tall and emit a light vanilla scent. Plus, they are toxic to deer, ensuring they remain untouched.

The Narcissus Carlton daffodils are easy to cultivate in well-drained soil, which we have in plenty, with six hours of sunlight or light shade. When planted at the end of November or early December, they bloom in early spring (February/March).

Bulbs can be pre-ordered through our club e-mail: landingsgardenclub@gmail.com. Please include your name & how many bags you would like (10 bulbs to a bag - each bag is \$10.00). Bulb are available for presale and will also be available for purchase at the November meeting. If you're unsure how to plant them, directions are listed below.

Don't miss this opportunity! We have only 100 bags available, and once they're gone, we won't be able to order more until next fall.

# Guidelines for Planting Daffodil Bulbs



- 1. Choose a sunny spot for planting daffodil bulbs, ensuring they get at least six hours of sunlight daily. Avoid shaded areas, as these flowers need plenty of sunlight after blooming to produce flowers for the following year.
- 2. Make sure the soil has good drainage. Steer clear of locations where water accumulates after heavy rain or storms. Our sandy soil naturally promotes excellent drainage.
- 3. Once the daffodils have bloomed, wait a minimum of eight weeks until the leaves turn yellow before cutting any stems or leaves. It's important to prevent landscapers from weed-whacking them after blooming, as this year's yellow leaves are vital for producing next year's flowers!
- 4. Plant the bulbs four inches deep and space them three inches apart. Avoid using fertilizer. You can either plant them individually or dig a larger hole for several bulbs together.
- 5. Aim to plant the bulbs between late November and mid-December, and you can expect to see these yellow blooms by mid to late February.
- \*Avoid planting bulbs in pots, as they tend to dry out quickly and may retain stormwater, both of which are not suitable conditions for daffodil bulbs.

#### Let's Change the State Flower to a Native Species

The Cherokee Rose (Rosa laevigata) was named Georgia's state flower in 1916, based on the incorrect belief that it was native to the state. In reality, it originates from Asia, and its presence in Georgia stems from intentional cultivation.

To enhance the state's identity and support environmental conservation, the Georgia Native Plant Society advocates for the replacement of the Cherokee Rose with a native plant that reflects Georgia's natural heritage. The Sweetbay Magnolia (Magnolia virginiana) is a native tree found across the state and would serve as an excellent representative for Georgia's state flower.

Additionally, the Sweetbay Magnolia is a host plant for the Eastern Tiger Swallowtail, Georgia's state butterfly. This connection further emphasizes its value, as it contributes to vital pollinator habitats and the ecological diversity that makes Georgia one of the most vibrant landscapes in the United States.

# Skidaway Farms Submitted by Meg Kettlitz



In mid-August, we conducted a soil sample on our farm plot after it had been solarized for 14 weeks during the summer. The analysis revealed that the soil was deficient in potassium. To address this, we added a potash amendment and covered the plot, allowing it to rest while waiting for the soil and air temperatures to cool down. Fortunately, the plot has recovered well and is now ready for planting.

On October 18, we planted a variety of new crops for our project, including broccoli, cabbage, and carrots. Additionally, we included our cool-weather favorites: kale, lettuce, and radishes. The weather has been favorable, and the crops are thriving. We anticipate harvesting the radishes and lettuce by mid-November.

I am incredibly grateful for the dedication and hard work of my committee members on this project. Special thanks go to Karyn, Mary W., Phyllis, Sharon, and Elizabeth for their assistance with the October planting. # GAYLE'S FAVORITE WING RECIPE "BONE" APPETITE



2 LBS. CHICKEN WINGS (SUGGEST COSTCO BRAND - JUMBO SIZE)

MIX OF HERB AND SPICE BLENDS - 2 T MONTREAL SPICE BLEND, POULTRY SEASONING 1 SPRIG OF THYME / 1 T DRIED OREGANO / 1 T PARSLEY HUNGARIAN PAPRIKA. SALT. AND PEPPER TO TASTE

WASH WINGS IN A STRAINER, LAY OUT ON CUTTING BOARD AND PAT DRY WITH PAPER TOWEL PUT WINGS IN A LARGE BOWL AND TOSS WITH DRY SEASONING MIX PREHEAT AIR FRYER TO 375 DEGREES
