USING COLOR TO PLAN YOUR GARDEN

Color is an important element of garden design. After the basic structure of the garden is chosen, color can be used to add interest and evoke emotion. Warm colors (red, orange, and yellow) give a feeling of warmth and excitement. Warm colors can make an object appear larger and closer to you, making your space appear smaller.



Cool colors (green and blue) are calming and make objects look smaller which will make the garden appear larger. For example, purple looks cool next to a warm color and looks warm next to a cool color.

White is used for contrast and to separate conflicting colors. It glows in the garden at dusk and night time. White is also considered a neutral color to use in a garden. Neutral colors like white, black, green, and silver can help to separate colors that may clash, or tone down bright colors.

The way colors are combined can have a big impact on how individual colors appear as well as the overall feeling of a garden. Several common combinations called color schemes are helpful in selecting flowers, foliage, and garden accessories such as furniture, pillows, walls or umbrellas. Sometimes you'll have a color that can't easily be changed like the color of your house or patio furniture. In this situation it works well to incorporate that color into your scheme for the garden.

Most often selecting clolors for your garden is as easy as choosing ones you love and then add one or two coordinating colors. To better visualize how a color scheme will look, refer to a color wheel (which can easily be purchased on Amazon). The color wheel starts with a "pure" color on the outer band and then shows its' corresponding shades (darker colors) and tints (lighter colors) as well as complimentary colors. Utilizing this information, you are now ready to select plants that work well within selected color schemes.

Listed below are some basic color schemes that work well in planning a garden:

Monochromatic: utilize a single color, such as purple, as the base plant. Flowers and foliage in tints (lighter colors) and shades (darker colors) of purple make this a lovely color palate. You can add interest by incorporating different shapes and textures of plants within the color scheme.

Analogous: this scheme utilizes colors that are next to each other on the color wheel such as violet with red or yellow with orange.

Complementary: these are colors that appear opposite one another on the color wheel. Complementary colors look better together than they do by themselves. Examples include blue and orange; yellow and purple; or red and green. There is more contrast and excitement with a complementary color scheme.

Triad: the triad scheme utilizes three colors that form a triangle on the color wheel. This combination creates high contrast between the color groups.

Split Complementary: this theme consists of three colors, one focus color and two complimentary contrasting colors. A good example of this is primary color of yellow and complimentary violets such as red violet and blue violet.

These photographs are exaples of the different color schemes that work well in garden design:











Utilizing a color wheel and color theory to design a garden can seem intimidating, but I encourage you to play with different colors, schemes, and textures. You are certain to find some interesting color combinations as there unlimited options. The most important thing to remember is that the "right" colors for your garden, are the ones you love!

Audubon Garden Gnomes Pollinator Gardens Project

The Audubon Garden Gnomes are making "easier-to volunteer" changes to the pollinator gardens project. With our new Adopt-A-Garden plan volunteers can tend to a garden of their choice at a time that fits their schedule. Most of our gardens are in outof-play areas along the golf courses with a few in more public areas by a clubhouse. The objective is to increase habitat for pollinators while adding beauty to otherwise empty spaces. Special focus is on including plants that attract monarch butterflies whose numbers have been in dramatic decline over the past several years.

We maintain ten gardens throughout The Landings Club property. Currently five of these need adoption: Terrapin Point #1 and #6; Oakridge Pro Shop, Marshwood Clubhouse and Palmetto #9. All of these gardens are well established with the exception of Palmetto #9 which will be planted this spring. Each spring we conduct a spruce-up to add more plants and weed old foliage. Going forward the gardens require attention on a weekly basis.

Why not start a new Gnome Group with a few of your friends for a fun weekly social time or split the month up with other volunteers? Audubon covers the expense of all plants and needed materials. Let's all work together to beautify our island home while helping the pollinators in the process.

Georgia First Lady Camellia Dedication Ceremony

January 20, 2024 was a frigid day in Savannah with temperatures hovering around 35 degrees Fahrenheit. Despite the cold, there was warmth in everyone's heart as the latest addition to the historic Bonaventure Cemetery was dedicated.

This project was led by The Coastal Master Gardener Association in collaboration with The Bonaventure Historical Society, The Coastal Georgia Camellia Society and the City of Savannah. Liz Pascual, the MGEV Project Lead, worked on securing donations from some of the local garden clubs, The Coastal Camellia Society and The Coastal Master Gardener Association.

The ten unique camellias were created at Loch Laurel Nursery near Valdosta, GA, by Mark Crawford. These camellias are meant to show appreciation for our most recent Georgia First Ladies. The camellias were planted at the entrance to Bonaventure in October 2022 by the Master Gardeners. I planted the Elizabeth Harris one. None of the camellias were blooming during the planting. In February 2023, I attended The Coastal Camellia Society's tour of the camellias at Bonaventure and was pleasantly surprised at the number of blossoms on the Elizabeth Harris camellia I had planted. In fact, all ten of the Georgia First Lady Camellias were showing off their colorful full blooms.

At the dedication ceremony we found out which camellias had been sponsored by which group. The Landings Garden Club's camellia is dedicated to Mary Perdue, the wife of Sonny Perdue who served as Governor from 2003 -2011 . Her initiatives as First Lady center around the well-being of Georgia's

children.
