President's Message

Happy April showers that bring forth summer flowers!

I always have a myriad of topics I wish to discuss, making it challenging to focus on just one. Perhaps I should consider writing a book to compile all my thoughts for our members. We'll see how that idea develops.

As we welcome the start of spring and watch our gardens begin to thrive, the sweltering hot and humid dog days of summer will soon be upon us. These are the long, hot days that follow the summer solstice on June 21. What does this signify for us? It signals the arrival of summer's hottest and most uncomfortable days, often accompanied by high humidity. This is a crucial time to be mindful of when, and if, you choose to work outdoors. Heatstroke, dehydration, and other heat-related issues can arise, so remember to work outside during the early morning or evening hours. Stay hydrated and don't forget your sunscreen!

This period also reveals which plants can truly withstand our climate. The dog days help us identify the resilient survivors versus those that struggle. Below is a list of plants that have thrived in my garden over the years, despite the heat. Some may attract deer, so be sure to use deer repellent spray or keep them in a fenced area.

Perennials: Black-eyed Susan, Guara, purple shield (Strobilanthes), Cuphea, Blue plumbago, society garlic, blue daze (Evolvulus), Verbena bonariensis, tiger lilies, cannas, grasses, and salvias. Don't overlook Butterfly Milkweed-just ensure you select the right variety for our area. If you're uncertain about which Milkweed is best suited for Skidaway Island, reach out to our Master Gardener, Meg Kettlitz.

Annuals: Zinnia, Gomphrena, celosia, pentas, angelonia, impatiens, marigolds, and begonias. Many of these are already available for purchase, and if planted soon, they will bring vibrant summer colors to your garden.

These bright plants will thrive during the hot and humid dog days of summer, but they are best enjoyed from the comfort of our cooler indoors. So, do yourself a favor—plant now while the temperatures are pleasant, then relax with a cool drink and appreciate the fruits of your labor from inside.

Horticulture: Hort Short Submitted by Meg Kettlitz, Horticulture Chair



Many of us have areas in our gardens that retain water after a storm. A rain garden may be an option to help resolve this slowness in draining. If done properly, a rain garden can be a beautiful and beneficial addition to one's garden.

What is a rain garden? According to the Marine Extension and GA Sea Grant of UGA, it is a planned area in your garden that captures, filters and allows stormwater to soak into the ground.

How do you know if a rain garden can help you? First, observe your landscape during and after a storm. Are there areas where the water puddles? For example, does it puddle by a downspout or in a low lying area? What type of soil do you have? On Skidaway Island our soil is mostly sandy loam which is ideal for a rain garden.

Other things to consider before creating a rain garden are:

Distance to the foundation of your home. Do you have a septic tank, where are the utilities located on your property, the distance to trees, how big do you want the garden to be and do your HOA by-laws allow you to include this in your landscape plans?

Once you've decided the location of your rain garden, you will need to dig a depression no more than 7 inches deep (do not a dig a deep hole). A rain garden is not a pond, but is an area that is consistently wet. Once you have culitvated your desired location, you need to add soil ammendments and mulch. Before selecting your plants, make sure the prepared area is draining properly.

Once you've prepared the area and it is draining properly, you can then choose your plants. It is recommended that you use native plants. For our topography here on Skidaway Island, it would be Maritime/Coastal GA zone 9 native plants. The plants you select must also be able to handle changes in rain and drought conditions. Remember, a rain garden will use precipitation to water the plants (no irrigation needed). Also remember to choose plants based off of their final growth size so it is not overcrowded or under developed.

Commemorative 9/11 Tree Submitted by Pat Barry

I recently learned that the Liberty Elm Tree, which was donated by The Landings Garden Club and planted several years ago to honor the many lives lost on September 11, 2001, has unfortunately sustained significant damage and has become infected with mistletoe.

After conducting a thorough investigation, I found someone willing to assist in rededicating the plaque and planting a new tree. Greg Freeman, the Natural Resources Manager for The Landings Association, played a crucial role in finding a new site and selecting the ideal tree. A vibrant and beautiful young tree has now been permanently planted just inside the main gate, at the triangle where Landings Way North and South intersect.

A Saucer Magnolia was chosen for its strength and resilience. Commonly known as a "tulip" magnolia, this variety showcases deep burgundy and rose-hued blossoms. Naturally, this tree blooms for a few weeks before producing leaves.

The development of this tree species was supported by the Audubon Society in 1980 and is part of a collection of eight, all named after typical young girls. The tree planted in The Landings is aptly named "Ann," a lovely name that conveys grace and dignity, making it ideal for its purpose and location here on Skidaway.

As you navigate the traffic flow on Landings Way, I encourage you to take a moment to appreciate her. The original brass engraving is mounted on a sturdy disc cut from the Liberty Oak, which will rest flush with the ground near the tree.

On March 22, we kicked off our warm season garden planting. We had a fantastic turnout, with volunteers helping to plant 12 romaine lettuces, 6 sweet peppers, and 6 tomatoes. Additionally, we weeded and mulched the garden plot. We anticipate harvesting all of these vegetables by mid-June.

Under the previous chairmanship, the plot was solarized every summer to aid the soil's recovery from overuse. This year, we will leave two rows empty and rotate the crops each season. After the current vegetables are harvested, the plot will be covered during the summer and reopened in September. This covering will prevent weed growth while the plot is inactive.

Did you know that the LGC provides financial assistance for the children's garden at Skidaway Farms? On the same day we were planting, their group was also planting warm season vegetables, including both seeds and seedlings.

If you have never been to Skidaway Farms, I encourage you to do so. The 'farmers' are always willing to talk about what they are growing in their plots as well as share their gardening tips.

Ingredients:

- 2 medium Vidalia onions, chopped
- 1 cup light mayonnaise
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cups shredded Swiss cheese
- 1/8 teaspoon hot sauce

Paprika for garnish

Combine all ingredients in an ovenproof baking dish and sprinkle the top with paprika. Bake at 350 degrees Fahrenheit until bubbly, which should take about 30 to 40 minutes. Enjoy with Fritos Scoop-sized corn chips...yum!
